Our group has grappled with some difficult topics in the books we've read and discussed this year.

"No Friend but the Mountains" by Behrouz Boochani, a very well educated Kurdish-Iranian man who sent his horrific story to friends via his mobile phone whilst suffering in prison on Manus Island. Not something our group felt proud about.

"The Dictionary of Lost Words" by Pip Williams. We all enjoyed this book based on a true story.

Words from literate people were forwarded to lexicographers for the Oxford University Press's New English Dictionary. Protocols were followed that permitted words to be added to the dictionary. At the time most people in England were illiterate and their words were "lost"- not in the dictionary.

"Boy Swallows Universe" by Trent Dalton. A story of child abuse, drugs, gangs, murders, set in a violent working class suburban Brisbane fringe area. Some members couldn't finish the book but it did show that despite the horror, love is threaded through the story.

"Cockroaches" by Jo Nesbo a famous Norwegian author whose books have been translated into 50 different languages and more than 50 million copies sold around the world. We think he was having a down time when he wrote this book and wouldn't recommend it to anyone.

OUTING TO MOUNT LOFTY BOTANIC GARDEN

On 3rd May, 18 members met at the pavilion near the lake at Mt Lofty Botanic Garden.

After our box lunch, where we sighted a white swan and a cormorant drying their wings, we gathered for an introduction by June Littleford, who gave us an overview of the history of the garden which opened in 1977.

Our local guide, Helen Milne, has many years experience, so the botanical names just rolled off her tongue. We walked around the lake and immersed ourselves in the glorious colours of Autumn – scarlet, red, orange, yellow and bronze.

Ninety-seven hectares are dedicated to the cultivation and display of the world's cool climate plants, in a series of hillside gullies.

We saw quite a few sculptures by Greg Johns. The interpretation of each piece has also been translated and embossed in Braille.

There was a distinctive tree called "Big Boy" – not the tallest, but with the most wood volume. An unusual plant to touch (Gunnera) felt like plastic and grows close to the ground, with big crinkly leaves.

The most attractive smelling plant with flowers (Lucilia) was next to the toilet – very appropriate! Cathie and Noel Miller
